



<u>Joint ESD News</u> Conference

On July 19, a joint news conference was held in coordination with Travis County Emergency Services Districts to discuss wildfire preparedness and prevention.



ISO RATINGS

An ISO rating, short for Insurance Services Office rating, is a measure used by insurance companies to assess a community's firefighting capabilities. The rating evaluates factors like equipment, training, and water supply to determine how well a fire department can respond to emergencies. A lower ISO rating often results in lower insurance premiums for residents, as it indicates a higher level of fire protection in the community.
